

Immunization Law

All newly admitted pupils must provide proof of immunization for poliomyelitis, diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough), rubella (3-day measles), rubella (7-14 day measles), Hepatitis B and mumps. For further information, contact your family physician or Sonoma county Health Department. Consult your physician for dosages regarding the following immunizations:

Communicable Disease

Parents, please inform the school immediately if your child has a communicable condition (e.g. conjunctivitis (pink eye), head lice, measles, mumps, chicken pox, strep throat, etc.). Your communication to the school when your child has any of the above is very important. Other parents may need to be informed if their child has been exposed.

Medicine – Prescribing and Administering to Pupils

Children may not bring any medication to school without the required medical form, including all over-the counter medication, prescription drugs, medicated skin creams, lip balms, cough drops, etc.. **There are no exceptions.**

On field trips, any medication, prescription or otherwise, must be accompanied by the medication form and be secured and administered by an adult.

The school cannot accept responsibility for administering any kind of medication to students without the proper form, which is available from the office. The form must be completely filled out, signed by the attending physician and parent. Parents may however, come to school to give their child any necessary medication.

Serious Medical Condition/Treatment

Office personnel and your child's teacher(s) must be notified of any serious medical condition regarding a student and the specific treatment recommended by his/her physician.
